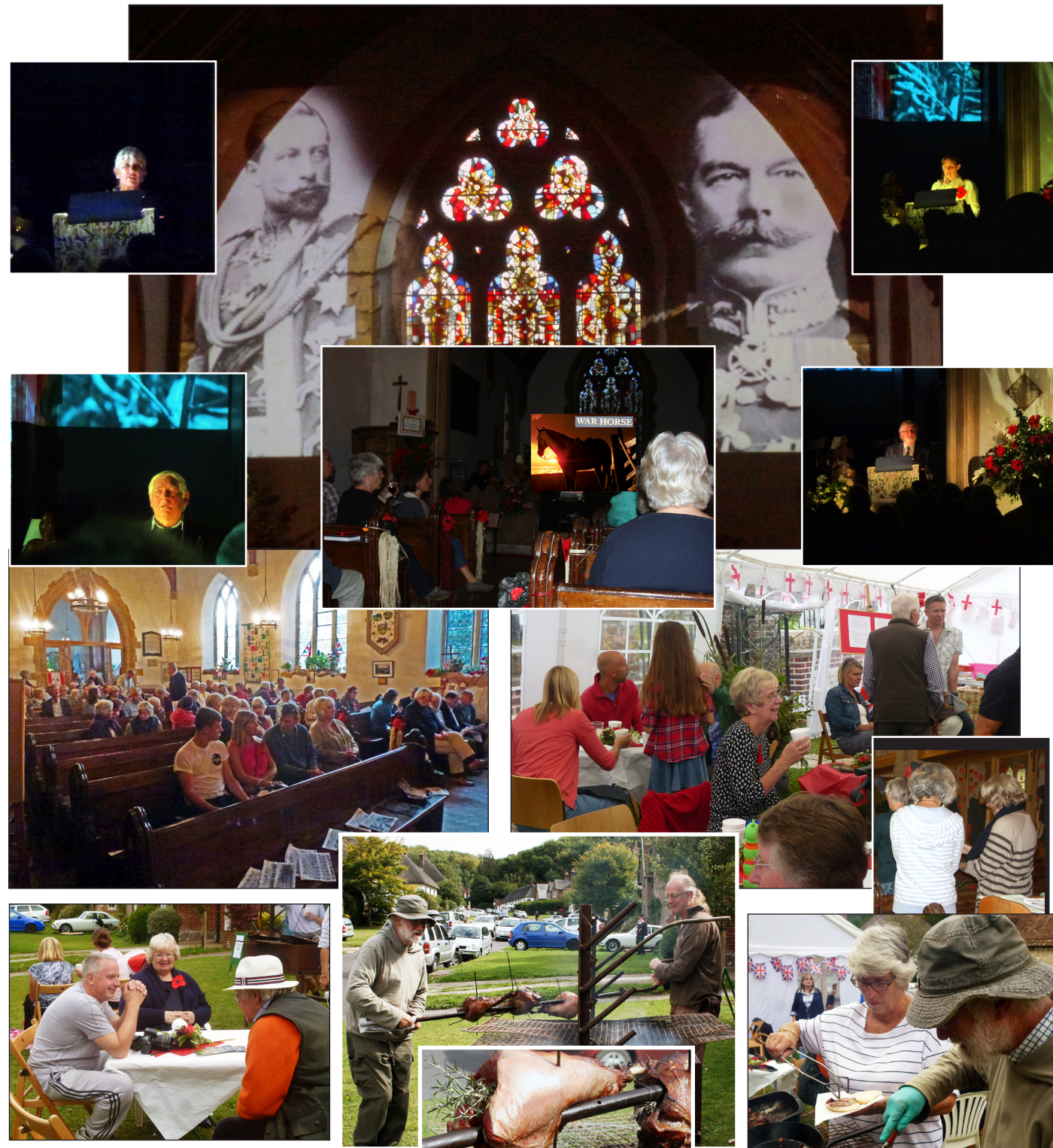


# Milton Abbas Remembers

The past is totally dependent on the present to safeguard its future. Stating the obvious perhaps, but this sad fact was not lost on, nor ignored by, the parishioners of Milton Abbas. Earlier this year a small group of villagers decided that a commemoration to mark the hundredth anniversary – ‘The Great War 1914 -1918’- should take place in Milton Abbas to honour and remember those who took part in that most hideous and bloody of wars. This was not a formal village response. The Parish Council did not officially respond to the occasion, but individual councillors at a personal level most certainly did, like so many others right across the community. All the events held during August were in aid of 3 charities caring for ex-servicemen. The Royal British Legion, BLESMA and SSAFA - all of which support seriously injured and disabled servicemen and women.



The commemoration began with a Silent Vigil that took place in St. James’ Church, 4th August, marking the declaration of war 100 years ago. Other events were scheduled for the August Bank Holiday Weekend. These included a Flower Festival ‘Flanders’ Flowers’ and the History Group elected to mount an extensive commemorative exhibition in the Reading Room. Refreshments were available for visitors in the Marquee.

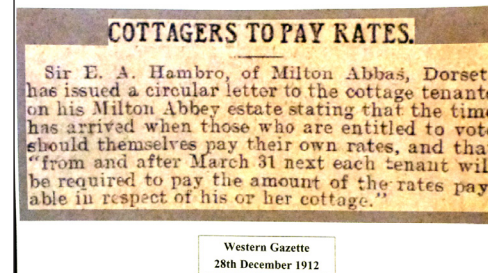
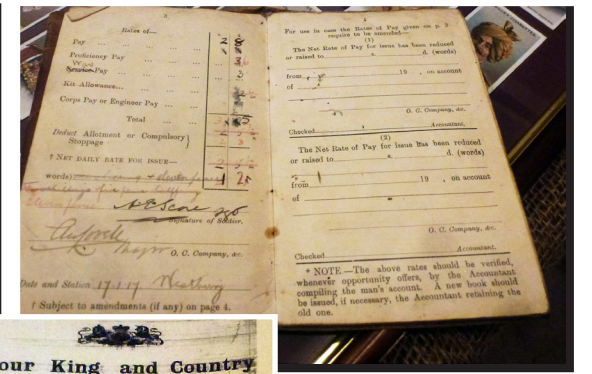
*The Bulletin is delighted to report that the total raised from visitor donations, plus profits from refreshments, was £2,950. Cheques are now on their way to the 3 charities.*

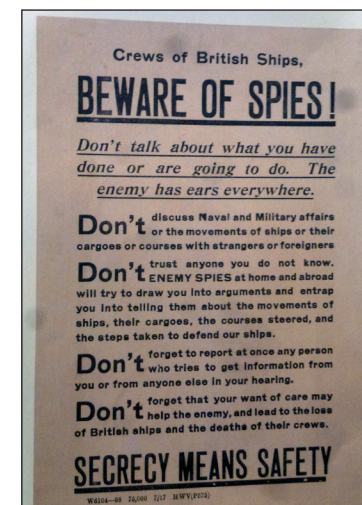

### Royal Naval Air Service

The Royal Naval Air Service (RNAS) was the air arm of the Royal Navy, under the direction of the Admiralty's Air Department, and existed formally from 1 July 1914<sup>1</sup> to 1 April 1918, when it was merged with the British Army's Royal Flying Corps to form a new service, the Royal Air Force, the first of its kind in the world. During its first year it continued to be the Naval Wing of the joint Royal Flying Corps (which had been set up in 1912), but was administrated by the Admiralty's new Air Department, but on 1 August 1915 the RFC became the flying branch of the British Army while the RNAS became "an integral part of the Royal Navy".
